November 2025 Chapter Meeting Speaker


Tom McMillan

2026 Tampa Tiberty Tree Project

The Tampa Chapter SAR is looking to Plant and Dedicate a New Liberty Tree

Once approved, we are looking at a date in Spring of 2026 as part of our 250th Celebration.

To get us there, we will need donations as the estimated cost is around \$600.00 for the tree and \$600.00 for the marker, minimally. We will have a Live Oak tree professionally installed at the site and will have a plaque engraved in stone commemorating the Nation's 250th birthday. Our Color Guard will participate along with the SAR, DAR, CAR and Local Scout Troops for the dedication.

The History of the Liberty Tree:

The Boston Liberty Tree was a famous American elm that served as a central meeting place and symbol for colonial resistance against British rule, particularly for the Sons of Liberty in the lead-up to the American Revolution. It was the site of key protests, including the 1765 Stamp Act demonstrations, where effigies were hung to express outrage. During the Siege of Boston in 1775, British soldiers cut down the original Liberty Tree to suppress the growing movement. News of the Boston Liberty Tree and its symbolism spread quickly to other colonies, leading to the establishment of similar "liberty trees" in towns across America. Where suitable trees were unavailable, large poles were erected to serve the same function—a place for posting official notices and staging political demonstrations.

October Historical Notes... by Bob Yarnell

The Philadelphia Campaign

August—December 1777, Part 2

In Part 1 of this series, we looked at the beginning of the Philadelphia Campaign. The opening phase ended with the British victory at the Battle of Brandywine.

Brandywine, Following Washington retreated towards Chester, keeping his army between British Gen. Howe's forces Philadelphia. Howe continued towards Philadelphia with the intent of crossing the Schuylkill River. Washington detached Gen. Anthony Wayne with approx. 2200 men to get behind the British. He was to send any information he could gather about their forces, movement etc., as well as try to cut off their baggage train as it crossed the river. Wayne later sent a message to Washington telling him all was going according to plan. Unfortunately, what Wayne did not know was that Howe was aware of Wayne's presence and decided to attack. (see note below).

On the night of September 20th, 1777, General Howe dispatched Major General Grey to deal with Wayne's division, camped near Paoli, Pa. At General Grey's direction the flints had been removed from his men's muskets to ensure that no shots gave prior warning to the Americans. The attack was to be at the point of the bayonet. The first troops of British rushed wave through the woods and attacked the American camp around mid-night. In the face of the British charge the Pennsylvania troops were dispersed and driven out of the camp to the West, many through a gap in a fence along the edge of the encampment. The American casualties seem to have totaled around 200 killed. wounded, or taken prisoner of whom around 55 were killed. The British are said to have had fewer than 20 casualties. Amboy of

Paoli was a severe humiliation for the Pennsylvania Continental troops but probably little more. The fight is referred to as the Paoli Massacre. It is difficult to see how that label can be justified in the light of the small number of American fatalities. Claims are made that the British took no prisoners. This allegation appears frequently in the Revolutionary War and is made against both sides.

The accusation made against Wayne was that he allowed his camp to be surprised. At Wayne's own

request he was subject to a court martial, which exonerated him of this allegation. Whether Wayne was taken unawares or not, the attack was well executed and highly successful, enabling General Howe to take Philadelphia within a few days with little further resistance from the main American army under George Washington.

Once he had captured Philadelphia, Howe moved a large number of troops to Germantown, outside the city. Washington sensed an opportunity to defeat a part of Howe's force and planned an assault on the British position. His plan was complicated, requiring four different columns to converge on the British position along four different roads.

On October 4, the Americans attacked. They enjoyed some initial success. but dense fog. miscommunication between the American columns and stiff British resistance halted the American The British regrouped, advance. counter-attacked and drove the from the field. Americans Washington fell back and established an encampment at Whitemarsh on Nov. 2.

Note: There is some conjecture and difference of opinion as to how the British learned of Wayne's presence in their rear. There were many loyalists in Pa. as well as British spies in the area and one theory is that, given the relatively casual nature of how warfare was conducted in the 1700's, Wayne's presence could have been easily detected by people living in the area, regardless of how many precautions he took and it would have been easy for someone to get word to the British. Theory number 2 is that a courier Wayne dispatched with an update to Washington was captured and theory number 3 is that the courier deserted and took the information to the British. If you work on the assumption that Wayne would send a courier he knew and trusted, it appears to me the probability of Wayne's location being relayed to the British by a loyalist in the area or a British spy is the probable answer.



An assortment of meeting between both Friday and Saturday produced some meaningful momentum for this coming 6-monts and

beyond. Some of the items addressed and voted on at this BOM was to stop the printed version of the FL Patriot magazine. Given postage and printing costs, versus the few subscriptions sold, it was actually losing a significant amount of

money to

publishing. The ETF reimbursement amount was passed to <u>raise</u> the disbursement amount up from \$500 to \$750 per disbursement. H.R.3057 Bill to install the National POW/MIA Memorial & Museum in Jacksonville, FL was voted to be supported by the FLSSAR & its chapters (see more later on p. 22). We were informed that the NSSAR has picked up the <u>liability insurance costs</u> to cover all state societies and down to/including the chapters.

The evening wrapped up with an enjoyable banquet with a nice showing of awards and presentations.

Mr. Bean of Florida (for himself, Mr. Webster of Florida, Mr. Carson, Mrs. Luna, Mr. Diaz-Balart, Mr. Buchanan, Mr. Rutherford, and Mr. Scott Franklin of Florida) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Veterans' Affairs, and in addition to the Committee on Natural Resources, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned

A BILL

To designate the POW/MIA Memorial and Museum in Jacksonville, Florida, as the National POW/MIA Memorial and Museum, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

SECTION 1. Short title.

This Act may be cited as the "National POW/MIA Memorial and Museum Act".

SEC. 2. Findings.

Congress finds the following:


- (1) The POW/MIA Memorial and Museum is a civic landmark and cultural institution being built as of the date of the enactment of this Act in Jacksonville, Florida, to honor, connect, inspire, and educate all people about the 142,000 members of the Armed Forces who have been captured as prisoners of war since World War II and the approximately 82,000 members of the Armed Forces who are currently missing in action or unaccounted for since World War II.
- (2) The POW/MIA Memorial and Museum is a unique and comprehensive project developed for the exclusive purpose of honoring former prisoners of war, those who were missing in action, those still missing and unaccounted for, and for providing a venue for families of these men and women to tell their stories.
- (3) The POW/MIA Memorial and Museum will publicize the stories of such individuals, showcase the history of the POW/MIA logo, the history of the Naval Air Station Cecil Field as a master jet base, and will serve as a reflective facility for all.
- (4) The POW/MIA Memorial and Museum will attract and educate a diverse group of people through visitor-centered, interactive, participatory exhibits, and will provide a place for educational programs, special events, and activities connecting all generations.

SEC. 3. National POW/MIA Memorial and Museum.

(a) Designation.—The memorial and museum that is, as of the date of the enactment of this Act, being constructed on an approximately 26-acre area on POW-MIA Memorial Parkway, Jacksonville, Florida, shall be designated as the "National POW/MIA Memorial and Museum".
