From the desk of the FLSSAR President...

"On December 4th, the Florida Society Executive Committee held our monthly meeting, and had a lengthy discussion about Florida's continued participation in the Club Express pilot program. After significant discussion about the benefits and drawbacks, the overall usage of the system, and the costs associated with the system, the Executive Committee has made the decision to withdraw Florida from further participation in the Club Express pilot effective December 31, 2025. The decision was based on very low usage of the system over the past two years (less than 15% of our members used the system to pay their dues electronically), and the significant cost that the Florida Society would have incurred in order to cover the \$3.00 administrative fee for the other 85% of our membership that is not using the system... The primary impact of this is that at the State Society level, we will no longer be offering electronic dues billing and dues payment. "

2026 Tampa Liberty Tree Project

The Tampa Chapter SAR is looking to Plant and Dedicate a New Liberty Tree

Once we get the site approved, we are looking at a time-frame in Spring/Summer of 2026 as part of our 250th Celebration.

The History of the Liberty Tree:

The Boston Liberty Tree was a famous American elm that served as a central meeting place and symbol for colonial resistance against British rule, particularly for the Sons of Liberty in the lead-up to the American Revolution. It was the site of key protests, including the 1765 Stamp Act demonstrations, where effigies were hung to express outrage. During the Siege of Boston in 1775, British soldiers cut down the original Liberty Tree to suppress the growing movement. News of the Boston Liberty Tree and its symbolism spread quickly to other colonies, leading to the establishment of similar "liberty trees" in towns across America. Where suitable trees were unavailable, large poles were erected to serve the same function—a place for posting official notices and staging political demonstrations.



What Most People DON'T Know About Valley Forge

It was an integrated community.

The encampment at Valley Forge included 12,000 inhabitants. Working and living among them, were 750 black soldiers. The African-American patriots, although not initially welcomed by either George Washington or the Continental Congress, proved their worth at Valley Forge.

In the end, there would be more than five thousand African-Americans who fought in the American Revolutionary War. The United States Army would not be similarly integrated until the Korean War almost 175 years later.

It was not that cold.

Historical records now confirm that the winter of 1777–1778, was not as harsh as originally thought. Valley Forge, located just 20 miles southeast of Philadelphia, saw temperatures fall into the single digits on just two occasions. Ironically, this made living conditions, even worse. The mud, the slush, the constant changes in weather from above-freezing to below-freezing, made soldiers' lives even more difficult. Their day-to-day struggles and their assigned tasks became considerably more difficult.

My three sons.

George Washington surrounded himself with smart and experienced men throughout the revolutionary war. But he chose just three men to become his closest friends and most trusted confidants. All of them were very young.

These three men were said to be like sons to the childless 45-year-old commander-in-chief. They included Alexander Hamilton, age 22, Hamilton's closest friend, John Laurens age 23, and the Marquis de Lafayette, just 19 years old when Washington first made him a General in the Continental Army.

Hamilton and Laurens were with Washington at Valley Forge. All three were very much a part of George Washington's inner circle, for the remainder of the revolutionary war.

No food, no clothes, and no place to sleep.

Most people are vaguely aware of the terrible conditions at Valley Forge during the winter of 1777–1778. But did you know precisely how bad it was?

Washington himself estimated that 1/3 of his 12,000-man army had no shoes. The majority of the men had no coats. In fact, when those men stood guard duty, they often stood on their hats. This widespread tactic was designed to avoid frostbite from the ice and snow. It was not an effective strategy and many of the men lost toes and fingers as a result. Those soldiers lucky enough to own blankets, used the worn and tattered material as a coat.

When a delegation from the Continental Congress paid a visit to Washington at Valley Forge, they were shocked to see men standing outside wearing little or even no clothes at all. The men were wrapped in a blanket and nothing more. Congress would henceforth argue a lot less about the financials appropriations which Washington regularly requested.

When the Commander in Chief first arrived at Valley Forge, he ordered each man to build his own 12 x 12 hut and cover the dirt floor with loose straw. Washington expressed his hope that the men would at least be warm when they were in their huts. Finding loose straw in the middle of winter, however, was no easy task.

In addition to all of that, an extreme shortage of food existed. It should come as no surprise that 1/3 of Washington's 12,000 man army deserted their posts well before the spring of 1778. That would be more desertions than at any time during the Revolutionary War.

Viva la France!

George Washington used his time in winter quarters to entirely remake the Continental Army. He recruited Prussian General Baron Freiderich, von Steuben to train the men in the proper conduct of war. The transformation was miraculous. The drill master, who could curse in several languages, was loved and respected by the soldiers. And the US Continental Army

quickly became a serious challenger to Britain's Army, the largest and most powerful in the world.

General Louis de Portal, the man credited with creating the precursor to today's Army Corps of Engineers, directed the erection of defensive works at Valley Forge. He, along with General Henry Knox, rebuilt and thoroughly fortified the encampment such that the British refused to attack George Washington's winter quarters, for fear of failure.

Polish Count Casimir Pulaski, transformed Washington's motley crew of scouts and mail riders into an effective and highly disciplined Calvary. Their strategic transformation suddenly rendered Washington's daily communications timely and effective.

And, it was during Washington's stay at Valley Forge, that the commander-in-chief appointed General Nathaniel Green as the Army's Quartermaster. Greene was a miracle worker. In relatively short order the men had food, clothing, and decent shelter.

But perhaps the most significant improvement in both morale and performance came when France decided to ally itself with the United States. Washington learned of the Franco-American alliance while at Valley Forge in May 1778. It was formal recognition that the United States could very well win its fight for independence and begin the country's journey to becoming the greatest nation in the history of the world. In retrospect, Valley Forge was not George Washington's worst nightmare.

It was his finest hour.





Mr. Bean of Florida (for himself, Mr. Webster of Florida, Mr. Carson, Mrs. Luna, Mr. Diaz-Balart, Mr. Buchanan, Mr. Rutherford, and Mr. Scott Franklin of Florida) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Veterans' Affairs, and in addition to the Committee on Natural Resources, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned

A BILL

To designate the POW/MIA Memorial and Museum in Jacksonville, Florida, as the National POW/MIA Memorial and Museum, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

SECTION 1. Short title.

This Act may be cited as the "National POW/MIA Memorial and Museum Act".

SEC. 2. Findings.

Congress finds the following:

(1) The POW/MIA Memorial and Museum is a civic landmark and cultural institution being built as of the date of the enactment of this Act in Jacksonville, Florida, to honor, connect, inspire, and educate all people about the 142,000 members of the Armed

Forces who have been captured as prisoners of war since World War II and the approximately 82,000 members of the Armed Forces who are currently missing in action or unaccounted for since World War II.

(2) The POW/MIA Memorial and Museum is a unique and comprehensive project developed for the exclusive purpose of honoring former prisoners of war, those who were missing in action, those still missing and unaccounted for, and for providing a venue for families of these men and women to tell their stories.

(3) The POW/MIA Memorial and Museum will publicize the stories of such individuals, showcase the history of the POW/MIA logo, the history of the Naval Air Station Cecil Field as a master jet base, and will serve as a reflective facility for all.

(4) The POW/MIA Memorial and Museum will attract and educate a diverse group of people through visitor-centered, interactive, participatory exhibits, and will provide a place for educational programs, special events, and activities connecting all generations.

SEC. 3. National POW/MIA Memorial and Museum.

(a) Designation.—The memorial and museum that is, as of the date of the enactment of this Act, being constructed on an approximately 26-acre area on POW-MIA Memorial Parkway, Jacksonville, Florida, shall be designated as the "National POW/MIA Memorial and Museum".






